MACS will make sure any barriers for disabled people are thought about.



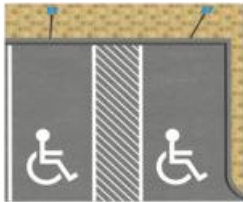
MACS will go to meetings to give advice to Paths for All.
